MARCH OF DIMES CANADA

March of Dimes Canada (officially the Rehabilitation Foundation for Disabled Persons, Canada) is a nationally registered charitable organization that provides support services to children and adults with disabilities, their families and caregivers.

PROGRAMS

Peer Support Services is comprised of two primary groups: Stroke Recovery Canada® and Polio Canada®. Peer Support Services aims to provide stroke and polio survivors, their families, caregivers and health care professionals with information, resources and support. The fiscal year 2008 - 2009 has been one of renewal and growth.

This past year March of Dimes Canada resurrected the Leaders in Volunteer Education (L.I.V.E) Conference which provides training for stroke and polio support group leaders. The conference helped to solidify relationships with existing groups, and revived a post-polio support group in Peterborough.

Polio Canada® represented March of Dimes internationally, with two delegates attending the 9th Annual Post-Polio Health International Conference, making new global contacts in post-polio support and research.

Ten Post-Polio chapters across Canada met monthly via teleconference to share ideas and build support. Staff visits to Polio Quebec strengthened the relationship with this chapter, provided support for offering bilingual service in Quebec. A Polio Quebec representative now participates in the monthly teleconference. The updated *PoliO'Canada* newsletter focused on survivor stories and health issues suggested by readers' feedback.

Polio Canada Highlights:

- As of March 31, 2009 the Polio Canada registry has 5,140 members
- By the end of fiscal year 2008 2009, there were 232 new members; 123 from Ontario and 109 from the rest of Canada
- Information packages and resources were sent to 116 people
- A monthly newsletter, "Highlights," sent out to 20 Chapter Chairs
- The website <u>www.poliocanada.com</u> received an average of 550 unique site visits per month

Stroke Recovery Canada® (SRC) chapters increased through staff working with chapter representatives from across the country, participating in more conferences, and sharing knowledge with partner agencies and healthcare professionals.

SRC received significant funding from both sanofi-aventis and Bristol-Myers Squibb in order to update the March of Dimes Canada website relating to SRC.



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SRC established a project entitled "Linking Survivors with Survivors" (LSWS). This regionally-coordinated peer survivor model of service delivery facilitates the smooth transition of stroke survivors back into the community. LSWS is a three year project funded by the Waterloo-Wellington Local Health Integration Network (LHIN).

The Stroke Survivor Research Project was initiated to capture the experiences of participants in local stroke recovery peer support groups.

SRC welcomed a new group in Whitehorse, Yukon Territory and laid groundwork for groups in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and British Columbia.

A task group was established to review chapter manuals and policies, and then provide a "best practices" framework that will help SRC better support its chapters.

The newsletter, *The Phoenix*, was updated and is focusing on survivor stories. More health-related content was developed to respond to the reader's needs and interests.

Stroke Recovery Canada Highlights:

- 1,957 individual members in SRC registry
- 335 new members; 205 from Ontario and 130 from the rest of Canada
- Information packages and resources were sent to 205 people
- SRC website received an average of 1,000 unique site visits per month
- A monthly newsletter, "Highlights," sent out to 50 Chapter Chairs

Conductive Education® (CE) is an innovative learning system that merges elements of education with rehabilitation to help people with neurologically-based movement difficulties improve their independence and mobility, building confidence and self-esteem.

CE Conductors hold specialized bachelor level degrees, enabling them to work with program participants to help them gain, or regain, physical mobility, self-sufficiency and independence, one small step at a time.

Conductive Education Highlights:

- Conductive Education services began at The Functional Performance Center in Mississauga, Ontario, in Fall 2008, allowing us to serve the west end of the Greater Toronto Area
- London/Woodstock sites were closed
- at the end of 2008 2009 fiscal year,
 CE has five operating sites; two in the
 Greater Toronto Area in Ontario and
 three in Halifax, Nova Scotia
- provided a total of 822 hours of service to 62 Nova Scotia consumers (18 adults and 44 children)




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CanVet Vocational Rehabilitation Services

The CanVet program went live on April 15, 2009. March of Dimes now has permanent CanVet offices in Halifax, Nova Scotia and Quebec City, Quebec.
